

Post-Visit Report

James M. Niemann Faculty Exchange with UWC

Funded by a grant shared by the University of Missouri's ("MII"), South African Education Program ("UMSAEP"), and the University of Western Cape ("UWC"), James M. Niemann, traveled to UWC from January 30 through February 7, 2019, to further the purpose of the trip, which is more "furthering the relationship between" law schools of law entrepreneurship. Legal Clinic ("ELC"), and UWC, with the opportunity will be given to the establishment of an entrepreneurial legal clinic at UWC's law school. As set forth in the grant proposal abstract, each of the intended outcomes was achieved.

Intended Outcomes:

1. Development of an accountable framework for an entrepreneurship legal clinic at UWC's law school
2. Cultivation of lasting, meaningful relationships between the University and UWC for future assistance with the development of an entrepreneurial legal clinic at UWC
3. Sharing legal and curricular substantive information that will further assist current and future UWC faculty to engage with fostering innovation by leveraging its law school's talent in collaboration with the Cape Town and UWC entrepreneurial ecosystems.

The itinerary for the trip was carefully crafted by Deputy Vice Chancellor Academic, Mr. Mervin Lawack, and her Director of Strategic Academic Partnerships, Dr. Anna Maurtin. MII's UMSAEP Executive Director, Dr. Shamiel Jassiem, also attended the planning while also attending each of the meetings and events planned. Rod was an essential help, both as a facilitator and participant. There were two meetings in Cape Town, substantial visits with the Dean, Jacques de Ville, and the Faculty Dean of Law, the law school clinic director, Shamiel Jassiem, DVC-Academic Law School, Dr. Anna Maurtin, DVC and Dr. Diane Davies, Chairman of the Faculty of Natural Sciences, and up administration of a meeting from the Natural Sciences and Economic and Management Sciences (EMS) programs.

The pinnacle of the trip was my presentation to the ELC. I was asked to present potential for UWC's vision of to surpass a grant application which the event was hosted by DVC Lawack and Dr. Maurtin. I anticipated my trip in December 2018, the Secretary of EMS, Dean de Ville, Professor Jassiem, and others in law clinic faculty in addition to faculty at FMS and Natural Sciences. During an interactive discussion, Dr. Jassiem, Dr. Davies, and the Natural Sciences designee both responded with interest in the prospect of such a program for UWC, which would offer experiential learning in entrepreneurial law while developing a program that could be used on campus and in the community. During the discussion, Dr. Lawack informed me that she would budget for the creation of an entrepreneurial legal clinic at UWC's law school, and further promote experiential learning initiatives for both law graduate and undergraduate students.
